Journey to Coordinated Eligibility and Enrollment (CEE) Implementation



Step 1. Develop a Common Understanding

In My Community...

- 1. Families are often unaware of which programs exist to serve young children and have to search multiple places to learn about them.
- 2. Families who need the services most may have the hardest time getting access to what they need.
- 3. Families have to submit multiple applications for programs or providers they are interested in and wait to hear where they can go.
- 4. Providers of similar services can feel like they are competing with each other for children and families.
- 5. Programs or providers have to wade through a large number of applications to find families who are eligible and a good match.
- 6. Individual families may choose programs in a way that does not make for the most efficient use of public funds when looking across *all* families.



The Promise of CEE

- Families have improved and more equitable access to services
- Providers collaborate rather than compete
- Public resources are used more efficiently

Moving from Competition to Collaboration


The Collaboration Spectrum

Key Questions in Choosing a CEE Goal

- Which program enrollment processes?
- Which programs/providers (scope of coordination)?
 - Within service sector (e.g., early care and education, benefits) or across?
 - Need data sharing and joint data management capacity
- Coordinated at what level(s) of governance (level of implementation)?
 - May depend on whether local providers are involved
 - States can provide support and guidance to local communities
 - Best when decision-making is aligned and data flows between local and state levels

- Select school choices.

- Answer questions and upload documents for eligibility verification directly in the Parent Portal.

Key Takeaways

- CEE is a systems-building strategy that requires widespread community buy-in to plan for and implement
- It takes an initial investment in relationship-building, time, and resources, but leads to
 - Easier, more equitable access to services for families
 - Collaboration rather than competition as the strategy for achieving full enrollment for providers, and
 - More efficient use of public resources for the community
- It also takes expertise on the what, why, and how of CEE
